



R.A.D.A.R. stands for **R**emote **A**ccessed **D**Atabase **R**esources. These Databases are both diverse and subject specific. The most exhaustive database to which the MHS Library has access is Gale Cengage Learning. It is provided free to all public libraries in the State of Oregon (who contracts with Gale). The Gale/Cengage database replaced EBSCO,( which was the vendor with whom the State of Oregon contracted for many years). Gale can be accessed from the District Home Page (look under Staff Resources, Library) or it can be accessed from the MHS Library Web Page. To get to the MHS Library Web page, one has to go to the MHS Site, **Select: Students; Select: Library.**
